### 2.QGIS Releases


During the year of 2019 we released 20 versions of QGIS consisting of 17 bug fix releases and 3 new major and minor releases (see detailed list below).



In March 2019, the <u>end of life of the previous version 2.18 LTR</u> was announced and 3.4 became the new LTR.

Another highlight of 2019 are the <u>new signed Mac installers</u> which aim to improve the installation experience on Mac OS.

QGIS 3.4.6 LTR Server has been successfully <u>certified as a compliant WMS 1.3 server</u> against the OGC certification platform, and moreover, it is even considered as a reference implementation. Furthermore, <u>support for the OGC API for Features protocol has been added</u>.

### 5. Votes and elections

The elected members consisted of 23 User Group voting members (<u>https://qgis.org/en/site/forusers/usergroups.html</u>), 23 Community voting representatives and 1 OSGEO voting member.

At the end of the year 2 new user groups (Mexico and Netherlands) were formed. Being past the October 31st deadline the groups are registered as official groups starting from 2020 and will be able to vote from 2021.

The QGIS Grant Programme in 2019 resulted in the <u>selection of six proposals</u>. Reports from the 2018 winning proposals have been <u>published on the QGIS.ORG blog</u>.
